66 books

40+ authors

3 languages:

- Hebrew mainly Old Testament
- Greek mainly New Testament
- Aramaic some Old Testament verses & New Testament phrases

1 consistent message

Old Testament

5 Books of the Law – Genesis to Deuteronomy

12 Books of Israel's History – Joshua to Esther

5 Books of Wisdom and Poetry – Job to Song of Solomon

5 Major Prophets

12 Minor Prophets

New Testament

5 Books of History – Matthew to Acts

21 Epistles – Romans to Jude

1 Prophesy – Revelation

Why are there so many different types of Bibles?

- Formal equivalence word-for-word translation – King James Version (KJV), New King James Version (NKJV)
- Dynamic equivalence sense-forsense translation – New English Bible (NEB), Contemporary English Version (CEV)
- Optimal equivalence uses both formal and dynamic equivalence – New International Version (NIV), New Living Translation (NLT)
- Paraphrase "in your own words" –
 The Message, Living Bible

What are some different types of Bibles?

- Study Bible
- Themed Bible
- Parallel Bible

- Divinely inspired 2 Timothy
 3:16
- Absolutely trustworthy –
 Matthew 5:18
- **Powerful influencer** Hebrews 4:12
- Food for the soul Psalm 119:103
- **Light of life** Psalm 119:105
- Provides moral guidance Exodus 20:1-17

What is personal quiet time?

- Daily time alone with God's word
 - Mark 1:35 Jesus had time alone with God
- God wants to meet with you
 - James 4:8
- Guidelines for Quiet Time
 - Choose a consistent time
 - Choose a consistent place
 - Choose a method

Questions to consider during quiet time:

- Is there a command to obey?
- Is there a promise to claim?
- Is there a sin to avoid?
- Is there an example to follow?
- Is there a new truth or lesson to learn?

How can I study the Bible?

- By book
- By character or person
- By topic or theme
- By inductive study method
 - Observation What are the basic facts of this passage?
 - **Interpretation** What did the author mean in his own historical context?
 - Evaluation What does this passage mean in today's culture?
 - Application How can I apply what I have learned to how I live my life?

Section 3: Is the Bible reliable?

Eyewitness Evidence:

- The Gospels could be validated by the reader
 - Written 40-70 years after Jesus' death
 - Eyewitnesses were named to verify authenticity

Section 3: Is the Bible reliable?

Documentation evidence

The quantity of New Testament manuscripts is much greater than other ancient writings.

Ancient Writing	Number of Manuscripts	
New Testament	>24,000	
Homer's Iliad	~650	

The gap of time between the original writings and known copies is shorter with the New Testament.

Ancient Writing	Original Writing	Earliest Manuscript
New Testament	40-100 A.D.	125 A.D.
Homer's Iliad	900 B.C.	400 B.C.
